For the quadratic equation $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$,

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

Binomial Expansion

$$(a + b)^n = a^n + \binom{n}{1}a^{n-1}b + \binom{n}{2}a^{n-2}b^2 + \dots + \binom{n}{r}a^{n-r}b^r + \dots + b^n,$$

where n is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r} = \frac{n!}{r!(n-r)!} = \frac{n(n-1)\dots(n-r+1)}{r!}$.

$$\sin^2 A + \cos^2 A = 1$$

$$\sec^2 A = 1 + \tan^2 A$$

$$\operatorname{cosec}^2 A = 1 + \cot^2 A$$

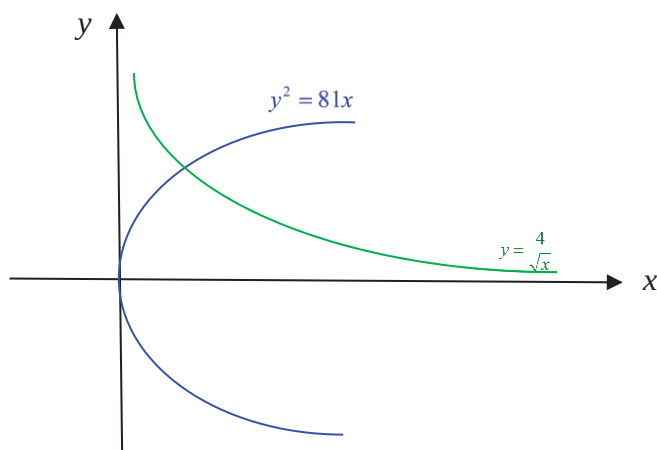

1. (a) On the same diagram, sketch the curves $y^2 = 81x$ and $y = \frac{4}{\sqrt{x}}$ for $x > 0$. [2]



- (b) The parabola $y^2 = 81x$ intersects the curve $y = \frac{4}{\sqrt{x}}$ at the point A.

Find the equation of normal to the curve $y = \frac{4}{\sqrt{x}}$ at A. [5]

$$\left(\frac{4}{\sqrt{x}}\right)^2 = 81x$$

$$x^2 = \frac{16}{81}$$

$$x = \frac{4}{9} \text{ or } x = -\frac{4}{9} \text{ (NA } \because x > 0) \quad \text{M1A1}$$

$$y = 6$$

$$\therefore A\left(\frac{4}{9}, 6\right)$$

$$y = \frac{4}{\sqrt{x}} = 4x^{-\frac{1}{2}}$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = -2x^{-\frac{3}{2}} = \frac{-2}{\sqrt{x^3}} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$\text{Gradient of tangent} = \frac{-27}{4}$$

$$\text{Gradient of normal} = \frac{4}{27} \quad \text{A1}$$

$$\text{Equation of normal: } y - 6 = \frac{4}{27}\left(x - \frac{4}{9}\right)$$

$$\therefore y = \frac{4}{27}x + 5\frac{227}{243} \text{ or } 243y = 36x + 1442 \quad \text{A1}$$

2. The equation of a polynomial is given by $g(x) = 2x^3 - x^2 + 8x - 4$.

(i) Find the remainder when $g(x)$ is divided by $2x$. [1]

$$\text{Remainder} = g(0) = -4 \quad \text{B1}$$

(ii) Explain why $g(x) = 0$ has only one real root. [4]

$$g\left(\frac{1}{2}\right) = 2\left(\frac{1}{8}\right) - \frac{1}{4} + 4 - 4 = 0$$

$(2x - 1)$ is a factor of $g(x)$ M1

$$g(x) = 2x^3 - x^2 + 8x - 4$$

$$g(x) = x^2(2x - 1) + 4(2x - 1)$$

M1 [Accept methods Fact grouping, comp coeff or Long Division]

$$\therefore g(x) = (2x - 1)(x^2 + 4) \quad \text{A1}$$

$$\text{For } x^2 + 4, \quad D = 0 - 4(1)(4) = -16 < 0$$

No real roots.

$(2x - 1)$ is the only factor of $g(x)$. } M1

(iii) Express $\frac{34}{2x^3 - x^2 + 8x - 4}$ in partial fractions. [4]

$$\frac{34}{2x^3 - x^2 + 8x - 4} = \frac{34}{(2x - 1)(x^2 + 4)}$$

$$\text{Let } \frac{34}{(2x - 1)(x^2 + 4)} = \frac{A}{2x - 1} + \frac{Bx + C}{x^2 + 4} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$34 = A(x^2 + 4) + (Bx + C)(2x - 1)$$

$$\text{Put } x = \frac{1}{2} : 34 = A\left(\frac{1}{4} + 4\right)$$

$$A = 8 \quad \text{A1}$$

$$\text{Put } x = 0 : 34 = 32 - C$$

$$C = -2 \quad \text{A1}$$

$$\text{Comparing coeff of } x^2 : 8 + 2B = 0$$

$$B = -4 \quad \text{A1}$$

$$\therefore \frac{34}{2x^3 - x^2 + 8x - 4} = \frac{8}{2x - 1} + \frac{-4x - 2}{x^2 + 4} \quad \text{or} \quad \frac{8}{2x - 1} - \frac{4x + 2}{x^2 + 4}$$

[Deduct 1 mark if this statement not shown]

3. Do not use a calculator in this question.

A cylinder with radius $(2 + \sqrt{3})$ cm has a volume of $\pi(26 + 4\sqrt{48})$ cm³, find the height of the cylinder in the form $m + n\sqrt{3}$, where m and n are integers. **[4]**

Let the height of the cylinder be h .

$$\pi(2 + \sqrt{3})^2 h = \pi(26 + 4\sqrt{48})$$

$$(4 + 4\sqrt{3} + 3)h = (26 + 4\sqrt{48})$$

$$h = \frac{26 + 4\sqrt{48}}{7 + 4\sqrt{3}} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$h = \frac{26 + 4\sqrt{48}}{7 + 4\sqrt{3}} \times \frac{7 - 4\sqrt{3}}{7 - 4\sqrt{3}} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$= \frac{(26 + 16\sqrt{3})(7 - 4\sqrt{3})}{49 - 48}$$

$$= 182 + 112\sqrt{3} - 104\sqrt{3} - 192 \quad \text{M1A1}$$

$$= 8\sqrt{3} - 10$$

4. It is given that $y = \frac{x^2}{2}(3-2x)^5$.

(i) Obtain an expression for $\frac{dy}{dx}$. [2]

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{x^2}{2} [5(3-2x)^4(-2)] + (3-2x)^5(x) \quad \text{M1}$$

$$= -5x^2(3-2x)^4 + x(3-2x)^5$$

$$= (3-2x)^4(3x-7x^2) \quad \text{A1}$$

(ii) Determine the set of values of x for which y is increasing. [2]

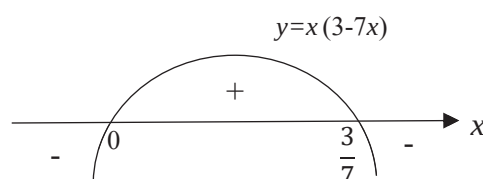
For y to be increasing, $\frac{dy}{dx} > 0$

$$(3-2x)^4(3x-7x^2) > 0 \quad \text{M1}$$

$$3x-7x^2 > 0$$

$$x(3-7x) > 0$$

$$\therefore 0 < x < \frac{3}{7} \quad \text{A1}$$



(iii) A point P moves along the curve $y = \frac{x^2}{2}(3-2x)^5$ in such a way that the

y -coordinate of P is decreasing at a rate of 0.05 units per second. Find the rate of increase of the x -coordinate of P when $x = 1$. [2]

$$\frac{dy}{dt} = \frac{dy}{dx} \times \frac{dx}{dt}$$

$$\frac{dy}{dt} = (3-2x)^4(3x-7x^2) \times \frac{dx}{dt} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$\text{Subst. } x = 1: -0.05 = -4 \frac{dx}{dt}$$

$$\therefore \frac{dx}{dt} = 0.0125 \text{ units/s} \quad \text{A1}$$

5. The function f is defined, for $0^\circ \leq x \leq 360^\circ$, by $f(x) = a - b \sin cx$, where a , b and c are positive constants.

- (a) Given that the period is 240° and the greatest and the least values of $f(x)$ are 7 and -1 respectively, find the values of a , b and c . [3]

$$\frac{360^\circ}{c} = 240^\circ$$

B1

$$\therefore c = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$a - b = -1 \text{ ----- (1)}$$

$$a + b = 7 \text{ ----- (2)}$$

$$(1) + (2) : \quad 2a = 6$$

$$a = 3$$

B1

$$b = 4$$

B1

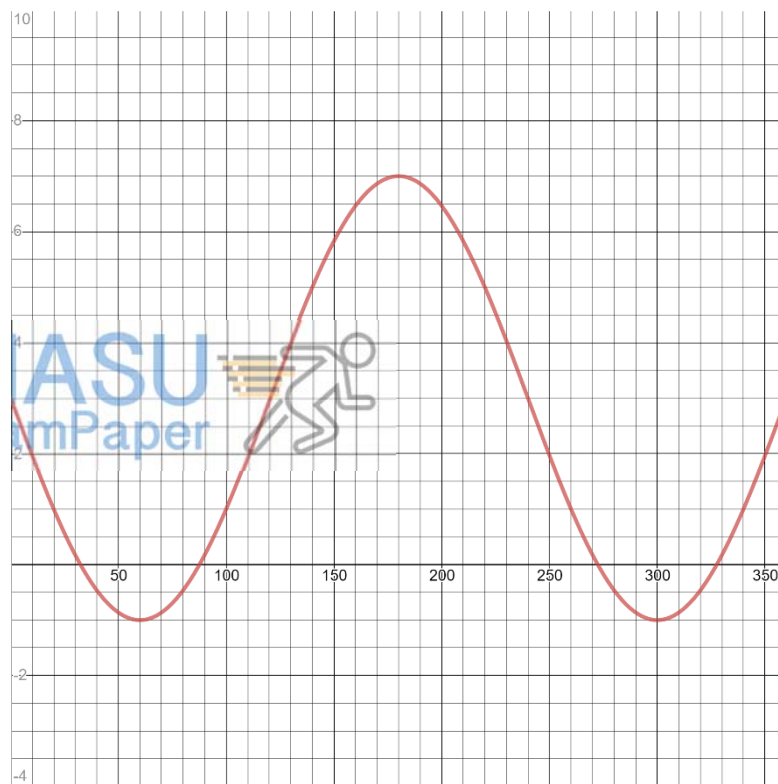
$$\therefore f(x) = 3 - 4 \sin \frac{3}{2} x$$

- (b) State the amplitude of $f(x)$. [1]

$$\text{Amplitude} = 4$$

B1

- (c) Sketch the graph of $y = a - b \sin cx$. [2]

6. At the beginning of 2020, Mr Lim bought an antique watch for \$ 8000. It was believed that the value of the antique watch will increase continuously with time such that its value increased 10% after every 3 years.

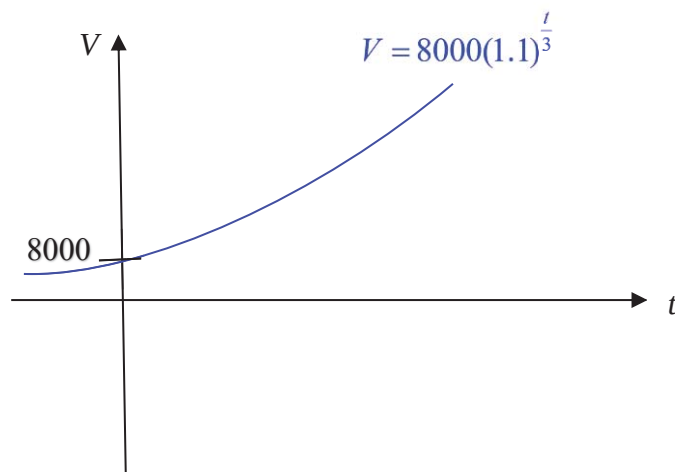
- (i) Find the value of the antique watch after 15 years, correct to the nearest dollar. [1]

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Value of watch} &= 8000(1.1)^{\frac{15}{3}} \\ &= \$12884 \text{ (nearest dollar)} \quad \text{A1}\end{aligned}$$

- (ii) Write down an expression for \$V, the value of the antique watch, after Mr Lim owned it for t years. [1]

$$V = 8000(1.1)^{\frac{t}{3}} \quad \text{A1}$$

- (iii) Sketch the graph of V against t . [1]



- (iv) Using your answer in part (ii), find the year that Mr Lim's watch first appreciates to \$50 000. [3]

$$\begin{aligned}8000(1.1)^{\frac{t}{3}} &= 50000 \\ (1.1)^{\frac{t}{3}} &= 6.25 \\ \frac{t}{3} \lg 1.1 &= \lg 6.25 \\ \frac{t}{3} &= \frac{\lg 6.25}{\lg 1.1} \\ \therefore t &= \frac{3 \lg 6.25}{\lg 1.1} = 57.68\end{aligned}$$

M1A1

$$\text{Year} = 2020 + 57 = 2077 \quad \text{A1}$$

7. (a) Given that $\int_a^b (\sqrt{3x+2}) \, dx = 5$, where a and b are positive constants.

- (i) Evaluate $\int_b^a (\sqrt{12x+8}) \, dx$ [2]

$$\int_b^a (\sqrt{12x+8}) \, dx = \int_b^a (2\sqrt{3x+2}) \, dx \quad \text{M1}$$

$$= -2 \int_a^b (\sqrt{3x+2}) \, dx$$

$$= -2 \times 5 \quad \text{A1}$$

$$= -10$$

- (ii) Explain why $\int_a^b (\sqrt{3x+2}) \, dx$ cannot be found when $a = -1$. [1]

$$\int_{-1}^b (\sqrt{3x+2}) \, dx = \left[\frac{(3x+2)^{\frac{3}{2}}}{\frac{3}{2}(3)} \right]_{-1}^b$$

Since $(3x+2)^{\frac{3}{2}}$ is only defined when $3x+2 > 0$, i.e. $x > -\frac{2}{3}$,

$\int_{-1}^b (\sqrt{3x+2}) \, dx$ cannot be evaluated.

- (b) Solve the equation $\frac{\log_2 x}{\log_x 8} = 3$. [4]

$$\log_2 x = 3 \log_x 8$$

$$\log_2 x = 3 \left(\frac{\log_2 8}{\log_2 x} \right) \quad \text{M1}$$

$$(\log_2 x)^2 = 9$$

$$\log_2 x = 3 \text{ or } \log_2 x = -3 \quad \text{M1}$$

$$x = 2^3 \text{ or } x = 2^{-3}$$

$$\therefore x = 8 \text{ or } x = \frac{1}{8} \quad \text{A2}$$

8. (a) Without using a calculator, and showing all your working, find the exact value of

$$\cos \frac{\pi}{4} \cos \frac{5\pi}{12} - \sin \frac{\pi}{4} \sin \frac{5\pi}{12} \quad [2]$$

$$\cos \frac{\pi}{4} \cos \frac{5\pi}{12} - \sin \frac{\pi}{4} \sin \frac{5\pi}{12} = \cos \left(\frac{\pi}{4} + \frac{5\pi}{12} \right) \quad \text{M1}$$

$$= \cos \left(\frac{2\pi}{3} \right) \quad \text{A1}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{2}$$

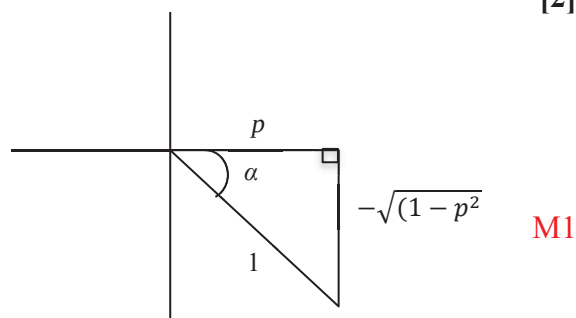
- (b) Given that θ is reflex and $\cos \theta = p$, where $p > 0$.

Express the following in terms of p .

- (i) $\tan \theta$ [2]

θ is in 4th quadrant.

$$\tan \theta = -\frac{\sqrt{1-p^2}}{p} \quad \text{A1}$$



- (ii) $\sec\left(\frac{\pi}{2} - \theta\right)$ [2]

$$\sec\left(\frac{\pi}{2} - \theta\right) = \frac{1}{\cos\left(\frac{\pi}{2} - \theta\right)}$$

$$= \frac{1}{\sin \theta} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{\sqrt{1-p^2}} \quad \text{or} \quad -\frac{\sqrt{1-p^2}}{1-p^2} \quad \text{A1}$$

9. (i) Write down the general term in the binomial expansion of $\left(2x - \frac{1}{3x^3}\right)^6$. [1]

$$\text{General term} = \binom{6}{r} (2x)^{6-r} \left(-\frac{1}{3x^3}\right)^r \quad \text{B1}$$

- (ii) Explain, showing your working clearly, if there is a term independent of x in the expansion. [2]

$$6 - r - 3r = 0$$

$$r = \frac{3}{2} \quad \text{M1}$$

Since r is not a natural number/positive integer, there is no term independent of x . M1

- (i) Using the general term, or otherwise, determine the term independent of x in the

$$\text{binomial expansion of } \left(3x^2 + 1 + \frac{2}{x^2}\right) \left(2x - \frac{1}{3x^3}\right)^6. \quad [4]$$

$$\text{For coeff of } x^{-2}: \quad 6 - 4r = -2$$

$$r = 2$$

$$\text{coeff of } x^{-2} = \binom{6}{2} (2)^{6-2} \left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)^2 = 26 \frac{2}{3}$$

$$\text{For coeff of } x^2: \quad 6 - 4r = 2$$

$$r = 1$$

$$\text{coeff of } x^2 = \binom{6}{1} (2)^{6-1} \left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)^1 = -64$$

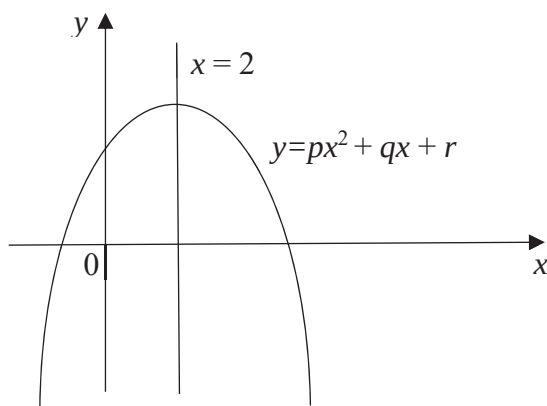
M1A1 for either correct method & answer

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Otherwise Method: } \left(2x - \frac{1}{3x^3}\right)^6 &= (2x)^6 + \binom{6}{1} (2x)^5 \left(-\frac{1}{3x^3}\right) + \binom{6}{2} (2x)^4 \left(-\frac{1}{3x^3}\right)^2 + \dots \\ &= 64x^6 - 64x^2 + 26\frac{2}{3}x^{-2} - \dots \end{aligned} \quad \text{M1A1}$$

$$\left(3x^2 + 1 + \frac{2}{x^2}\right) \left(2x - \frac{1}{3x^3}\right)^6 = \left(3x^2 + 1 + \frac{2}{x^2}\right) \left(\dots - 64x^2 + 26\frac{2}{3}x^{-2} + \dots\right)$$

$$\text{Term independent of } x = 3\left(26\frac{2}{3}\right) + 2(-64) = -48 \quad \text{A1}$$

The diagram above shows part of the graph of $y = px^2 + qx + r$.

The equation of line of symmetry of the curve is $x = 2$.

Determine the conditions for each of the following expressions, justifying your answer.

(i) $q^2 - 4pr$ [2]

(ii) $\frac{dy}{dx}$ when $x = 2$ [2]

(iii) q [2]

- (i) [Method 1 :] Since the curve cuts the x -axis at two real and distinct points,
 [Method 2 :] Since the equation $px^2 + qx + r = 0$ has two real and distinct roots,
 [Method 3 :] Since $p < 0$, $r > 0$, $-4pr > 0$ M1
 $\therefore D = q^2 - 4pr > 0$. A1

- (ii) Since the line of symmetry is $x = 2$, the point on the curve where $x = 2$ is a stationary/turning point. M1
 $\therefore \frac{dy}{dx} = 0$. A1

- (iii) $\frac{dy}{dx} = 2px + q$
 When $x = 2$, $4p + q = 0$
 $q = -4p$
 [Method 1 :] Since the curve has a maximum point, $p < 0$
 [Method 2 :] $\frac{d^2y}{dx^2} = 2p < 0$ ($\because$ max pt), $p < 0$. M1
 $\therefore q > 0$. A1

11. The points $P(-6, 1)$, $Q(4, 5)$ and $R(-3, 8)$ lie on a circle C .

- (i) Find the gradient of each of the lines PR and QR . [1]

$$\text{Grad. of } PR = \frac{8-1}{-3+6} = \frac{7}{3}$$

$$\text{Grad. of } QR = \frac{8-5}{-3-4} = -\frac{3}{7} \quad \text{B1 [Award only if both grads correct]}$$

- (ii) What do your answers to part (i) imply about the line PQ relative to the circle C ?
Show your working clearly.

[2]

Since $(\text{Grad. of } PR) \times (\text{Grad. of } QR) = -1$, $\angle PRQ = 90^\circ$.

Using right-angle in a semi-circle property, PQ is the diameter of the circle C .

- (iii) Find the equation of the circle C . [3]

$$\text{Mid-point of } PQ = \left(\frac{-6+4}{2}, \frac{1+5}{2} \right) = (-1, 3) \quad \text{M1}$$

$$\text{Radius} = \sqrt{(-1+6)^2 + (3-1)^2} = \sqrt{29} \quad \text{B1}$$

$$\text{Equation of circle } C : (x+1)^2 + (y-3)^2 = 29 \quad \text{or} \quad x^2 + 2x + y^2 - 6y - 19 = 0 \quad \text{A1}$$

- (iv) Write down the exact coordinates of the lowest point of the circle C . [1]

$$\text{Lowest point} = (-1, 3 - \sqrt{29}) \quad \text{or} \quad (-1, 3 - \frac{\sqrt{116}}{2}) \quad \text{B1}$$

- (v) Find the equation of tangent to the circle C at P . [3]

$$\text{Grad. of line joining centre and } P = \frac{3-1}{-1+6} = \frac{2}{5}$$

$$\text{Grad. of tangent at } P = -\frac{5}{2} \quad \text{B1}$$

$$\text{Equation of tangent at } P : y-1 = -\frac{5}{2}(x+6) \quad \text{M1}$$

$$\therefore y = -\frac{5}{2}x - 14 \quad \text{or} \quad 2y = -5x - 28 \quad \text{A1}$$

12. A curve $y = f(x)$ is such that $f''(x) = 24\sin 4x - 12\cos 2x$ and has a stationary point $\left(\frac{\pi}{4}, 1\right)$. Show that $f''(x) + 4f(x) = k\sin px + q$, where k , p and q are constants to be determined. [6]

$$f''(x) = 24\sin 4x - 12\cos 2x$$

$$f'(x) = \int (24\sin 4x - 12\cos 2x) dx$$

$$f'(x) = \frac{-24\cos 4x}{4} - \frac{12\sin 2x}{2} + C_1, \text{ where } C_1 \text{ is an arb. const.} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$f'(x) = -6\cos 4x - 6\sin 2x + C_1$$

$$\text{Subst. } f'\left(\frac{\pi}{4}\right) = 0$$

$$-6\cos \pi - 6\sin \frac{\pi}{2} + C_1 = 0$$

$$6 - 6 + C_1 = 0$$

$$\therefore C_1 = 0$$

$$\therefore f'(x) = -6\cos 4x - 6\sin 2x \quad \text{A1}$$

$$f(x) = \frac{-6\sin 4x}{4} + \frac{6\cos 2x}{2} + C_2, \text{ where } C_2 \text{ is an arb. const.} \quad \text{M1}$$

$$f(x) = \frac{-3\sin 4x}{2} + 3\cos 2x + C_2$$

$$\text{Subst. } f\left(\frac{\pi}{4}\right) = 1$$

$$-\frac{3}{2}\sin 2\pi + 3\cos \frac{\pi}{2} + C_2 = 1$$

$$\therefore C_2 = 1$$

$$\therefore f(x) = \frac{-3\sin 4x}{2} + 3\cos 2x + 1 \quad \text{A1}$$

$$f''(x) + 4f(x) = 24\sin 4x - 12\cos 2x - 6\sin 4x + 12\cos 2x + 4$$

$$f''(x) + 4f(x) = 18\sin 4x + 4 \quad \text{A2}$$

$$\therefore k = 18, \quad p = 4 \text{ and } q = 4$$

[Award A1 if either k , p or q is wrong]

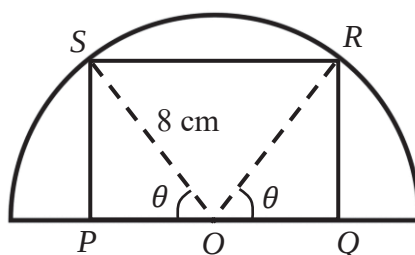

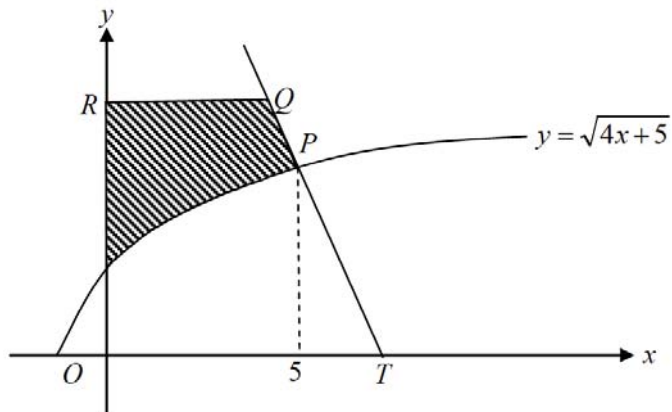

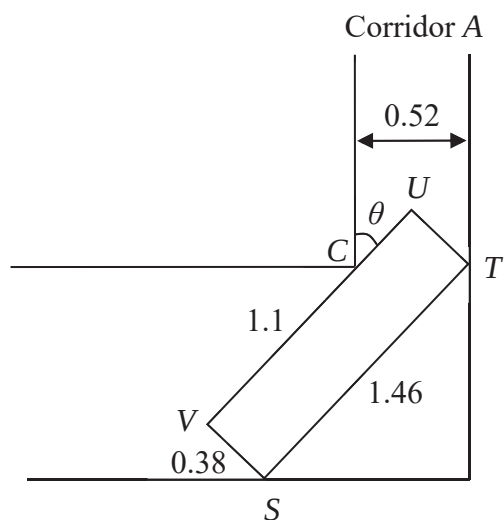
